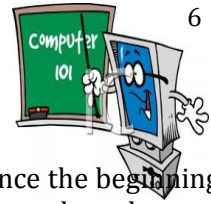

The L'ARSE Golf group meets to play on the second and fourth Monday of each month. We are in our third season of operation and, currently we have thirty-four members. We try to play a variety of courses and make our selections taking price and proximity into account. Last season we played Atlantide, Golf Dorval, St. Raphael, Glengary, St. Francois, Caughnawaga, La Cite, Riviere Rouge, Le Versant and The Falcon. We played May through November with participation varying between four and six foursomes. One valiant twosome actually braved the elements to complete the season on December 5 at Club International 2000.

Our goal is create an opportunity to play rather than an obligation. A week or so in advance of each game, we send out an e-mail to our members asking who would like to play. Based on response, we book starting times to accomodate all who have replied positively. Once the set of slots has been filled, individuals deciding later to join in must book their own tee times. Some of our members play virtually all games; some play more sporadically. Generally we play eighteen holes but try to make accomodations for those who would prefer to play nine holes.

For those interested in playing every week, generally one of us books a couple of starting times and puts out the invitation and spots are filled on a first come first served basis. On Monday, May 7 Mike Kirk organized and seven of us played Atlantide's Don Quixote Course. Our first regular game was held on May 14 and twelve of us played St. Raphael.

Our skill levels vary considerably. We have in common an enjoyment of the game, the exercise and the company, not necessarily in that order! If you think you might be interested in trying this out, we'd welcome you with open arms!

Gardeners

For many of our retired colleagues, gardening is a passion! Here are a few

Brenda Adams Henry: Despite an already busy retired life of working with McGill student teachers, travel and food bank volunteering, Brenda was thinking "what else is out there? Her naturalist mother reminded Brenda of her childhood fascination with dirt, as in creating clay cowboys, building forts in the woods and playing in a sandbox. So Brenda began to tackle the gardens of her and husband Phil's Beaconsfield home. Brenda, who Phil has labelled "Darth Weeder," describes her efforts to be more like artistic landscaping, rather than botanical knowledge. Brenda, who always has a pair of gloves, a tarp and a bag of tools in her car, is constantly on the lookout for stones, bricks and plants for her garden. She once enclosed a garden for about \$200 rather than the \$4500 quote from a landscaping firm. Brenda also helps a few senior women with their small gardens. "They call me when their garden needs a haircut." When her newfound pals can't distinguish between a plant and a weed, Brenda says "when in doubt, don't yank it out!" "Gardening is like teaching. You turn something that maybe nobody noticed, and coax it to grow in a different direction. But with gardening there is no dress code, bells, boss or marking. "You're alone in nature, dressed like a bum, hands deep in dirt"

Julie Nadler: Before Julie bought a one hundred plus year old Lachine house ten years ago, she had never gardened. The house was in need of major restoration and Julie, with help and guidance from brother David, undertook much of the work herself. Her large u-shaped yard had also been unattended for a while and, in the domain of gardening, David was of little help. Julie has found that gardening is a hit or miss affair. One tip that Julie picked up from experts was, "If you really like a plant, buy two of them. Maybe one of them will survive!" This thought and especially its source has provided much solace through the years. Julie finds that the garden is always a work in progress; you think you have it right but another season/idea comes and you change your mind. One of Julie's yoga teachers says that gardening is about trying to get the colours right. A gifted artist, Julie favours blue and purple (though she recently completed a white garden out back). Friends have tried to trick her by buying her plants of other colours, in one case a pink hydrangea. That's when Julie learned that you can turn a pink hydrangea blue by adding acid to the soil. Julie's home and garden, a favourite haunt for neighbourhood cats and birds, was featured in a front page article in the Home Section of the Montreal Gazette a few years back. If you are looking for a great garden center, Julie recommends La Pepiniere Jasmin in St. Laurent.

Janice Tessier Murray Janice inherited a small back garden from her mother-in-law when she and Bryden bought his parents' house in the late seventies. She muddled along blindly and managed to kill nearly everything in the first couple of years, including all of Mrs. Murray's prized tea roses. After a few years of simply planting a few annuals every spring, she decided to try perennials again. Over the years, several flower beds have been added, often to solve a problem – to cover a large stump, to fill in an area of lawn devastated by white grubs, to replace areas where grass grew poorly. Gardening involves a lot of trial and error – what grows well in one person's garden won't necessarily grow well in another's. The secret is to find plants that you like, that like your growing conditions and that require the amount of care that you are willing to give them. Stick with those as the mainstay of the garden and try a little something new every year. To her, gardening is part art, part hard labour and part magic. A garden is a form of artistic expression, it dresses a house in the same way a painting completes a blank wall. Of course, there is always Mother Nature, with her Lily beetles and slugs and winter kill, to keep Janice humble.

We may also plan dinner beforehand at a nearby restaurant for those who are interested. The cost is \$20.50 per person, taxes included. One only has to look at the proliferation of “U-Brew” type establishments to know that many of us are into buying kits and making our own wine and beer. These guys, however, do it from scratch.

Raffaele D'Abramo: Raff, a member of the L'ARSE Golf Group, started making wine in Italy as a child when he would help stomp the grapes which the donkeys carted down the hills. His grandfather would say, “Jump around and do what you want in the vat...but no pee-pee or caca”! In Montreal, he used to make wine with his dad and now carries on himself every year. After much experimentation, he has boiled the process down to five steps: **1)** The week before Thanksgiving, he crushes the grapes and leaves them in a vat to ferment for seven days. **2)** On Thanksgiving weekend, when in his teaching days he had time, he presses the mash and returns the resulting juice into the vat for another week. Although the “experts” suggest adding yeast, Raff doesn't as the grape skins produce their own. **3)** He carefully siphons the juice into a fifty-litre demijohn to get rid of sediment and leaves it for forty-five days. **4)** He again decants into another another demijohn and leaves it for two-three months. **5)** By spring the wine is ready and could be bottled but Raff leaves it in the demijohn and fills gallon jugs when needed. Although probably no less expensive than making wine from a kit, Raff's wine has no sulfates or other artificial preservatives and, apparently, doesn't cause hangovers. The juice of the crushed grapes can also be simmered on a stove to make *musto cotto*, a maple-syrup like product which is wonderful in cooking rabbit. Not every batch of wine turns out well. Not-so-great batches can be converted into red-wine vinegar. Raff also distills lesser vintages to make grappa which he happily shares with his golfing buddies on those frosty outings in November and December.

Ken Elliott: Ken, also a L'ARSE golfer, started brewing his own beer from scratch in the 1990's and, at one point, won the American Home Brewing Association Local Chapter's annual award for both best stout and best beer. He quit brewing when the School Board gave him too much work to do (he also began a McGill doctoral programme at about the same time). In retirement Ken has taken up the art again with his son Michael who, long having been an accomplished consumer, is now growing in leaps and bounds in beer production skills. Ken readily admits that his process is not truly from scratch as he doesn't grow his own grain or hops. His process has nine steps and requires a glossary to understand. **1)** It starts like brewing tea...sit malted barley in hot water for an hour to **mash**. **2) Sparge** it by pouring hot water through the mash and drawing the **wort** (liquid good stuff) from the bottom. **3)** Boil the 20-25 litres of wort in hops for an hour and a half. This will make your whole house smell/reek of beer (depending on the perception of the brewer or the spouse). Ken now has an outdoor boiler! **4)** The first boil provides bitterness. After a while, more hops are added to provide flavour. A third, and later, dose of hops is added to provide aroma. **5)** Cool the boil down, as quickly as possible, to room temperature. (Mid-range temperature are susceptible to bacteria.) **6)** Transfer to another container, **the primary fermentor**, and add yeast. **7)** Set aside for five or six days while sugar changes to alcohol (**primary fermentation**). **8)** Transfer to a **carboy** for one week or so for **secondary fermentation**. **9)** Bottle when you can. Ken stresses that everything needs to be super clean!! The cost per bottle is less than \$0.75. He recommends Mout Internationale, which supplies most of Montreal's Brew-Pubs, as an excellent source of materials. Ken says that the the basic formula is: **Mash** and **sparge** change starch into sugar. **Fermentation** changes sugar into alcohol. (We're still working on the scientific notation for this formula).
